


- Corridor Maps combine the Routes of Regional Significance (RRS) maps to illustrate the multimodal nature of the transportation network

 - Corridors are highly generalized to show multimodal conditions where they do or will exist









Next Steps and Recommendation

Process for Action Plan Adoption

- Step 1: RTPC TAC reviews the Draft Action Plan and forwards to the Policy Board
 - LPMC TAC January 18th
 - SWAT TAC January 18th
 - LPMC TAC February 15th
- Step 2: Publication of Public Review Draft Action Plan
- Step 3: RTPC Policy Board approves the Draft Action Plan and forwards to CCTA for incorporation into the Draft Countywide Transportation Plan (CTP)
 - LPMC Committee March 6th
 - SWAT Committee March 6th
- Step 4: CCTA Planning Committee and Board accept the Draft Action Plans (April 2023)
- Step 5: Preparation of the Draft CTP (including all five Action Plans appended) followed by public review and adoption by the CCTA Board (late 2023 or early 2024)
- Step 6: RTPC Policy Boards formally adopt the Action Plans (early 2024)



Recommendation

Review and approve the Draft Lamorinda Action Plan and make a recommendation that CCTA incorporate the Action Plan into the Draft CTP.

Final adoption of the Action Plan will occur after the CTP Update is adopted.
